

Pinders Primary School – Weekly Newsletter

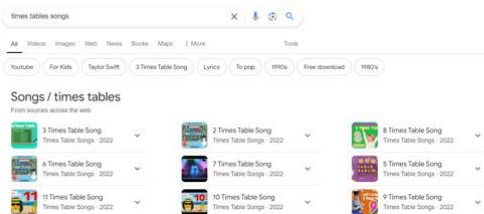
Dear Parent/ Carer,

Guidance to help you choose the right mobile phone for your child.

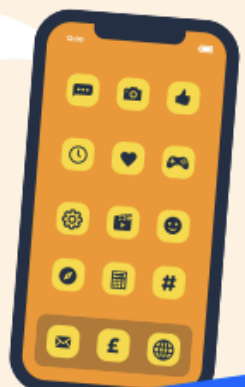

Features

- Internet access to learn, play and browse;
- A range of available apps;
- Contact with friends and family through calls, texting and social apps;
- Built-in and additional parental controls available for safety;
- Tracking and monitoring abilities for parents;
- User-friendly keyboard and features;
- A range of models and price points;
- Various mobile plans for data, messaging and calls.

Limitations

- Some models can be very expensive;
- Access to the internet presents more risk for potential harm;
- Shorter battery life compared to a dumb phone.



Smartphone

'Dumb' phone

Features

- Little or no app access except for built-in games on some mobiles to limit distractions;
- Contact with friends and family through calls and texting;
- A selection of models and mobile plans at largely affordable price points;
- Longer battery life compared to smartphones.

Limitations

- No access to the internet or additional apps;
- Communication restricted on many models to calls and text rather than apps that children's friends might use;
- Limited or no parental controls or tracking features for safety;
- Text messaging is less user-friendly on many models.

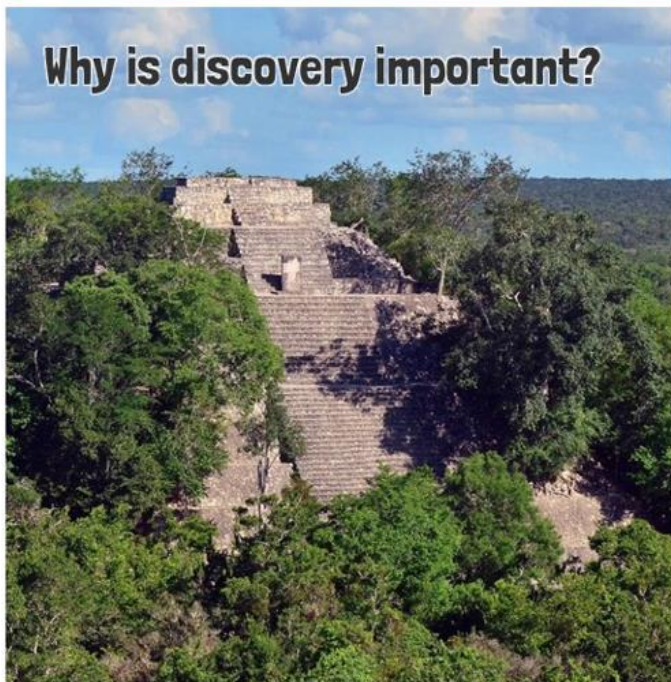

Why is discovery important?



In the news this week

A discovery of more than 6,000 ancient Maya structures, including a city of pyramids, has been named Valeriana. Hidden by jungle canopy in the Mexican state of Campeche, the city was discovered by chance. A student at Tulane University, in the US, found the city with the help of Lidar, a light detection technology, that uses lasers to map landscapes.
